# Biography

Arooj Aftab, Vijay Iyer, and Shahzad Ismaily *Love in Exile* Trio Written by Jace Clayton

Backstage after their 2018 debut show in their adopted hometown of New York City, Shahzad Ismaily asked Arooj Aftab and Vijay Iyer to huddle together and reflect on what had just occurred. "We felt it from the first moment," remembers Iyer. "We were mystified and almost silent and said: I don't know what just happened. But we should do that again." They hadn't prepared material in advance; the potent chemistry surprised even these seasoned collaborators. A shared focus on collective real-time creation allowed them to weave the bass, piano, and vocals into a breathtakingly unified sound. This was music in the moment. Words couldn't define it, but the audience felt it, and joined the emotional journey. Staying open to spontaneous co-creation became the band's defining approach in the half-dozen shows they played before recording their debut album.

Individually, their accolades are substantial — Grammy award winning vocalist Arooj Aftab wows audiences worldwide with her mesmerizing live shows; MacArthur genius and Grammy nominee Vijay lyer is one of today's most influential pianists; multi-instrumentalist Shahzad Ismaily's sensitivity and technical acumen has made him a legend among musicians like the late Lou Reed, for whom he was a session player. Yet the marvel here is how ego disappears as the three players merge to create a singular, gorgeous sound.

One key factor is how Aftab employs her otherworldly voice as another instrument in the ensemble. "I'm mostly using the words to get the sound out," she says. "I'm not thinking about telling a story." The voice-as-wind-instrument gels with the synth/keys combination of lyer and Ismaily that flows together like sunlight and shadow.

More broadly, by trusting in real-time creation — and each other — the band is able to cross-pollinate spontaneity with the accumulated wisdom of a lifetime in music. As Ismaily puts it, "I feel like we're subtly cueing listeners to say, *Live like this*."

Love In Exile. Three world-class musicians meet in New York City to forge a singular voice that takes their distinct backgrounds and vast histories of collaboration as a starting point. From there they explore one-of-a-kind performances defined by a sense of timeless beauty and sudden surprise alike.

serpentwithfeet: Heart of Brick

October 12 + 13

Brooklyn-born musician serpentwithfeet's experimental electronic music tenderly explores passion and love between gay Black folks. The Guardian said of his 2021 record DEACON, "There can be few albums this year more wholesome, soppy, or unabashedly life-affirming." He joins MacArthur "genius" Fellow Wu Tsang and choreographer Raja Feather Kelly to present Heart of Brick, a theatrical dance and musical performance that tells the story of two men finding themselves and falling in love in a gay dance hall and captures the multi-generational spirit of the Black queer community. Combining music created for the performance with material from serpentwithfeet's new album, as well as older songs, Heart of Brick is an evocative new work that embodies the sweetness and sincerity at serpent's core.

### Anjimile December 8

Anjimile won the world over with the clear-eyed honesty of his first record — a meditation on spirituality and liberation, bolstered by Anjimile's delicate, earthy vocals. *Giver Taker* drew on musical influences ranging from African pop and Sufjan Stevens to a childhood spent in the church. *Rolling Stone* magazine deemed it one of the 50 best albums of 2020. In his sophomore album, *The King*, he continues exploring what it means to be a Black trans person in America.


