Scratching on things I could disavow: Walkthrough

The ICA/Boston presents Walkthrough, by leading contemporary artist Walid Raad, as part of his first comprehensive museum survey in the United States. Central to the exhibition is the importance of performance, narrative, and storytelling in Raad's oeuvre. The artist will give 55-minute presentations in the ICA's West Gallery multiple times over the duration of the exhibition. Raad's current ongoing project, Scratching on things I could disavow, examines the recent emergence in the Arab world of new infrastructures for the visual arts—art fairs, biennials, museums, and galleries—alongside the geopolitical, economic, and military conflicts that have consumed the region.

Silas Riener Performs Merce Cunningham's Changeling and **Boston Conservatory Students** Perform Excerpts of Work by **Merce Cunningham**

Former Cunningham dancer Silas Riener performs Changeling, a 1957 solo newly reconstructed in collaboration with Jean Freebury. Choreographed using chance procedures, the work premiered in 1957 at the Brooklyn Academy of Music and was last performed in Tokyo in 1964. A select group of Boston Conservatory dancers, under Riener's direction, perform a collage of excerpts from early Cunningham dances including Dime A Dance, Springweather and People, Septet, Nocturnes, and Minutiae. Pianist Stephen Drury performs music by John Cage and Christian Wolff.

JAN 9 + 10 | 2 + 3:30 PM The Prepared Piano

Pianist Elaine Rombola will perform selections from John Cage's famous "Sonatas and Interludes," which premiered at Black Mountain College. Arrive early to see her prepare the in-gallery piano to Cage's specifications by inserting screws, erasers, paper clips, and other objects into the strings.

JAN 16 + 17 | 2 + 4 PM **Polly Motley Performs Katherine Litz's** The Glyph

Commissioned by the ICA, and directed by Richard Colton, dancer and choreographer Polly Motley performs The Glyph, a whimsical work choreographed by dancer and teacher Katherine Litz at Black Mountain College in 1951. Like Cunningham, Litz pursued movement based on the logic of the body in space rather than an allegory of inner emotions. Pianist Yukiko Takagi performs Lou Harrison's score.

THEATER PIECE NO. 1 x 50

Declared the first Happening and later named "Theater Piece No. 1," an unnamed performance took place in August 1952 at Black Mountain College that would become one of the most famous events in the college's history. The ICA has invited five Boston-based artists to reimagine *Theater Piece No. 1* by proposing a series of actions that will take place in the ICA galleries and throughout the museum.

Local artist Dave Ortega has spent years interviewing his now 100-year-old abuela (grandmother) and telling her story in comics. In the Bank of America Art Lab he'll create a life-size comic book where participants can explore how stories and pictures are arranged to create narrative, and experiment with telling their own stories.

Ortega's work has appeared in several comics anthologies; his comic *Abuela y Los Dead Mexicans* was named a notable comic by Best American Comics. He's taught at the School of the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston and been an exhibitor at the Small Press Expo, Brooklyn Zine Fest, Grand Comics Fest, New York Art Book Fair, and Comic Arts Brooklyn, among other places. He is currently working on a graphic novel about his *abuela*.
